How can I dispose of batteries?

Alkaline batteries made in the United States (Energizer, Duracell, etc.) after 2010 do not contain mercury and can be thrown in the regular garbage. When purchasing batteries it is always good to consider buying rechargeable.

If you are still interested in recycling them you can bring it to our site below.

Alkaline batteries: (AA, AAA, C, D and 9-volt) take it to the Recycling site at 315 Sterling Street for recycling. Or you can call the Solid Waste Division for help 360-855-1884

Rechargeable batteries and button batteries: (commonly found in watches, cameras, calculators, cell phones, camcorders, etc.) contain heavy metals and are hazardous. Take to the Solid Waste Division 315 Sterling Street for recycling. Or you can call the Solid Waste Division for help 360-855-1884

Automotive Batteries: (Including cars, trucks, boats and heavy equipment) should be brought to a recycling facility it is free of charge to drop these off. Take it to the Recycling site at 315 Sterling Street for recycling. Or you can call the Solid Waste Division for help 360-855-1884
